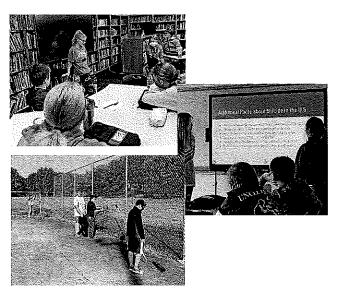

Notes from the Nurse

Focus on Vision:

This month's school nurse news focuses on vision. Did you know, one out of five children has some kind of vision problem. Although students with vision problems are often identified in school screenings, follow-up is crucial in identifying what treatment, if any, is needed. Because vision can affect learning, it is important for students who have difficulty with the school vision screening to follow-up with the eye doctor.

Vision problems in school aged children

Every child needs to have the following vision skills for effective reading and learning:

- Visual acuity—the ability to see clearly in the distance for viewing the chalkboard, at an intermediate distance for the computer and up close for reading a book.
- Eye Focusing—the ability to quickly and accurately maintain clear vision as the distance from objects change, such as when looking from the chalkboard to a paper on the desk and back. Eye focusing allows the child to easily maintain clear vision over time like when reading a book or writing a report.
- Eye tracking—the ability to keep the eyes on target when looking from one object to another, moving the eyes along a printed page or following a moving object like a thrown ball.
- Eye teaming—the ability to coordinate and use both eyes together when moving the eyes along a printed page, and to be able to judge distances and see depth for classwork and sports.
- Eye-hand coordination—the ability to use visual information to monitor and direct the hands when drawing a picture or trying to hit a ball.
- Visual perception—the ability to organize images on a printed page into letters, words and ideas and to understand and remember what is read. Signs of eye and vision problems



When certain visual skills have not developed, or are poorly developed, learning is difficult and stressful. A child may not tell you that he or she has a vision problem because they may think the way they see is the way everyone sees. Children will typically attempt to do the work, but with a lowered level of comprehension or efficiency.

Signs that may indicate a child has a vision problem include:

- Complaints of discomfort and fatigue.
- Frequent eye rubbing or blinking.
- Short attention span.
- · Avoiding reading and other close activities.
- Frequent headaches.
- Covering one eye.
- · Tilting the head to one side.
- Holding reading materials close to the face.
- An eye turning in or out.
- Seeing double.
- Losing place when reading.
- Difficulty remembering what he or she read.

Undetected and untreated, vision problems can have some of the very same signs and symptoms commonly attributed to Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), like hyperactivity and distractibility. Due to these similarities, children showing these symptoms should have a comprehensive vision exam with their doctor of optometry to avoid misdiagnosis.

How Can We Help?

There are some challenges for families when it comes to vision care. Parent's scheduling conflicts can make it difficult to get an appointment. Other barriers include lack of insurance, students' refusal to wear glasses, and forgetting or misplacing glasses. Since untreated vision problems are associated with learning deficits, we need to work together to ensure that students' who need glasses receive them, and most of all, wear them in school when needed.

My goal as a school nurse this year is to follow up with students who have difficulty with the vision screening and encourage students who have glasses to wear them. If they have glasses and aren't wearing them, I will attempt to find out the reason. Are they lost? Are they broken? Are they forgetting to wear them? Identifying why students are not wearing his/her prescribed glasses is important.

I can also help find financial assistance. Those families who do not have health insurance that covers vision, often qualify for the National Sight for Students program. As a member of the National Association of School Nurses, I have access to gift certificates that can provide a free exam and eyeglasses to those who qualify.

Educating the students, teachers, and parents is one way to spotlight the importance of caring for our vision. Please let me know if your child develops any symptoms during the school year or if you need assistance in any way.

Conferences will be completed digitally or over the telephone throughout the weeks of November 2nd-13th.







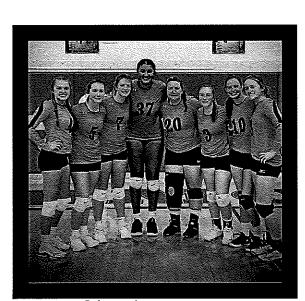
Firstie Fun

Zoom Opportunity and Expectations

As we navigate through our new "normal" this year, various situations arise such as 10-14 day quarantines, 3-5 days in isolation waiting for test results, distance learning, and even just sick days out for non-COVID illness. This year a huge positive is the availability to zoom into classes so students do not have to miss valuable in person instruction from our teachers. All students in grades K-12, have the ability to access in person instruction by joining zoom if one of the situations arise and most excitedly, if students need to stay home for non-COVID illness, they are able to zoom into classes and be counted as present for the day.

When students zoom into class here are a few expectations we ask you to follow:

- Students should be sitting upright at a surface such as a desk or a table.
- 2. Video must be turned on and students need to have the lights in the room on.
- Sound should be on so students can be active participants, but must have the ability to mute your sound if requested.
- Students can access work from their SeeSaw or Google Classroom account.
- If a student completes paper/pencil work, a picture needs to be taken and emailed or uploaded to their teacher that day.
- Students in K-6 need to have an adult in close proximity to assist with learning, if needed.

If you enter into a mandatory 14 day quarantine period, please contact the school at 515-389-3111 to make arrangements to pick up your device and other materials. Assistance with internet access can also be made if available by contacting Mrs. Smith.
